




How many sea turtle species are native to Georgia? 5

Caretta caretta (Loggerhead Sea Turtle)

From Sand to Sea

Our scientists monitor nests on the beach to learn more about the population of loggerhead sea turtles in Georgia. Use the information in this exhibit to complete the line graph below:



What do you notice about loggerhead nest numbers in Georgia?

They are increasing, females do not nest every year, conservation efforts are working, etc.

How can you protect sea turtles on the beach?

Only use red lights, fill in holes, knock down sandcastles, pick up trash, keep a respectful distance, etc.

Sargasso Sea:

Have you met our loggerhead hatchling ambassador? A hatchling is a turtle less than a year old. Observe our hatchling for five minutes and answer the questions below:

What behaviors did you see the hatchling do?

Examples: swimming, diving, eating, floating, sleeping, splashing, hiding, breathing How might these behaviors help this hatchling in the wild?


They may help it find food, migrate, breathe, hide from predators, rest, etc.

Loggerhead hatchlings swim to the Sargasso Sea and spend years living in the sargassum seaweed. This ecosystem provides benefits for both people and animals. List at least four reasons why the Sargasso Sea is important: A few possible answers:

- 1) An important habitat for sea turtles, whales, tuna, and American eels
- 2) Seaweed traps light and heat to keep sea turtle hatchlings warm
- 3) Ecosystem services such as carbon sequestration and oxygen production
- 4) Economic benefits such as ecotourism, recreation, and commercial fishing

Biological, Chemical, and Physical


High-quality food helps our patients to heal. What do our sea turtle patients get to eat during their time in the hospital?

Greens: romaine lettuce, leafy greens, cucumbers, and peppers

Loggerheads and Kemp's Ridleys: squid, shrimp, herring, mackerel, and crab

Patient Name: Emerson

Species: Loggerhead Sea Turtle

Why is this patient in the hospital?

Emerson was hit by a boat propeller and has several fractures (broken bones) in the carapace (top shell)

Example:



Patient Name: Tano

Species: Kemp's Ridley Sea Turtle

Age: Juvenile

Weight: 12 Pounds

Why is this patient in the hospital?

Tano was caught on a fishhook on Jekyll Island. X-rays showed 5 hooks and this turtle had a surgery to remove them.
